September 11, 2013 10:30 am Four Club Luncheon hosted by the Little Compton Garden Club, held at the Sakonnet Golf Club there. Lunch with speaker Nan Simpson whose topic, "The Essence of the Garden: What Makes a Garden Memorable" was enhanced by a local garden tour.

Tuesday, October 8, 10 am Conservation Chair and photographer, Jill Brody, led a small group of intrepid photographers on a clinic outdoors, followed by hot soup at her Providence home.

Tuesday, October 22, 10 am Cynthia Mason sheltered the group under her carport, as the trial run of making hypertufa containers were made in preparation for the Zone II Meeting in May. A materials fee covered expenses. [Hypertufa pots for the Zone Meeting were subsequently made in batches & cured under the superb guidance of Horticulture Chair, Kathleen Leddy].

Tuesday, November 12, 3 pm Lynne Merrill of the Newport Garden Club, created five very different lovely arrangements, providing helpful commentary and taking questions as she worked. These arrangements were then raffled to the assembled group, and funds raised were sufficient to pay Lynn's fee.

Tuesday, December 10 Greens Workshop, 2-4 pm. This event was planned to take place at the Tockwotten Home, providing an activity for Tockwotten residents as we assembled greens for area nursing homes and the women's shelter. However, a contagious bug at Tockwotten dictated a change in plans, as the elderly residents there were advised to keep to themselves until the virus had run its course. Central Congregational Church came to the rescue and we were able to set up tables to make the greens baskets, producing approximately 45, leaving some at Central, and delivering the rest. As always, a very popular meeting.

Wednesday, January 15, 5:30 pm at the home of Frances Trafton. Members brought delicious light refreshments, which were enjoyed as we heard a presentation by Mary Blue of Farmacy Herbs on herbal teas and tinctures, including remedies for various ailments. Following her talk, Dotsy Davison chaired the remainder of the meeting to discuss the Zone II Meeting that Perennial Planters will host in Providence on May 20-21, 2014.

This show brought members of both clubs together for the reception on April 2, with food and beverages, and good

conversation. Thanks to Fraser Gilbane, member of both clubs, for coordination of this fun event. Expenses were shared equally. Thanks to the RI Federated GC for their loan of the pedestals, delivered and returned by Handicraft Club (and South County GC) member, Janice Panoff.

May 6 Field Trip to Robin Hollow Farm, Saundertown, RI. Polly Hutchison welcomed our group to her farm where she grows flowers sold at RI farmers' markets and creates arrangements for weddings and other events, including the Zone II meeting in May.
