## Professor Dan Nadenicek

In the year when we celebrate the 150th birthday of the Jewel of Providence or the Roger Williams Park and the 200th birthday of Frederick Law Olmsted, it is fitting to gather with renowned expert Professor Dan Nadenicek to discuss the early days of Landscape Architecture.

Dan Nadenicek is a Professor Emeritus at the University of Georgia. He holds degrees in Landscape Architecture from the University of Minnesota and history from Minnesota State University, Mankato, MN. He taught landscape architecture at Penn State for eleven years before chairing the Department of Planning and Landscape Architecture at Clemson University from 2002 to 2008. He joined the University of Georgia and the College of Environment and Design (CED) in the Fall of 2008 and, there, served ten years as dean. He rejoined the CED faculty as the Constance Knowles Draper Chair of Landscape Architecture in 2018 and taught undergraduate, master's, and PhD students until retiring on July 1, 2021.

Throughout his career Nadenicek has focused his teaching and research on landscape history and the history of landscape architecture. His research and writing on Horace Cleveland emphasizes the origins of the profession in 19th century America and the relationship between early landscape architecture and prominent literary figures such as Ralph Waldo Emerson and Henry Wadsworth Longfellow. He is currently completing a book on Frederick Billings (1823-1890) of Woodstock, Vermont, who as an entrepreneur and land planner helped shape the American landscape from coast to coast.
